In early 1987 a group of interested persons met to form CLAYTON LIBRARY FRIENDS, an independent, non-profit support organization. Part of our purpose is to increase the holdings and facilities of CLAYTON LIBRARY, CENTER FOR GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH, and to give volunteer service to supplement staff

The Center has been in a building program, and in early 1987 plans for a new building were viewed publicly for the first time by the CLAYTON LIBRARY FRIENDS. One of our first major achievements was to secure a grant large enough for new furnishings and equipment. Groundbreaking ceremonies were held in October, 1987, and we're now marking off the days as move-in time draws near.

We invite the genealogical community around the world to share in our excitement, celebrate our good fortune with us, and to plan for a future visit.

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CLAYTON LIBRARY, CENTER FOR GENEALOGICAL RE-SEARCH is a department of the Houston Public Library, and began its existence in 1921 as a part of the Texas and Local History Room in the Julia Ideson Library Building downtown. In those days genealogy was a very small collection along with Texana and other special areas. By 1959, however, the genealogy collection totaled 4,718 books.





The City of Houston later received as a gift the beautiful WILL CLAYTON home for use as a library facility. In 1968, with 14,000 books. genealogy came into its own with the

of microfilm, plus various periodicals and other materials - with room to grow!

Having one of the top five or six genealogical collections in the country is impressive. Well known for its valuable collection, visitors from out of state and from out of the country soon become regular patrons. Because of the value of the collection, the rules may seem slightly more strict, and close surveliance is maintained to ensure that materials are not accidentally damaged, destroyed or removed; even so, there have been losses!

The collection includes records of births, deaths, marriages, wills, deeds, land grants, military rolls, county histories, cemetery inscriptions, published family genealogies and all the available census records from 1790 to 1900, and part of 1910. Expansion of the Center's microfilm readers to 70 is just one of the things anxiously awaited.

We have been most fortunate to have some excellent bibliographies on Clayton's major collectionsprepared by the staff, available free to visiting researchers. Researchers are also encouraged to participate in Library's Family Exchange Program. Special cards are available for patrons who wish to enter their genealogical data.

In 1987 more than 41,000 patrons did their research at CLAYTON LIBRARY. On a January, 1988, Saturday, a record 214 researchers used the collection!

With space to breath, researchers will find comfortable and spacious facilities, and with the CLAYTON LIBRARY FRIENDS continuing to seek contributions, new books and microfilm should continue to arrive on a regular basis.

With only a "fall" opening date in view, it is advised that anyone planning a visit to Clayton Library after the middle of September should call (713) 524-0101 to check the hours open. Plans call for a one week closeing for the move ... just across the parking lot at 5300 Caroline, Houston, Texas 77004-6896.
