### Welcome New Board Members!



# -1930 Census

s the April 2002 release date of the 1930 census approaches, 172 very kind and generous donors have given \$31,073.50 to Clayton Library Friends for purchasing microfilm of the 1930 census. In fact, Texas is 100% subscribed and several other states are nearly 100% subscribed.

As reported in an earlier issue of *The CLF Newsletter*, the entire census costs \$90,678; all soundex, \$53,958; all enumeration district descriptions, \$1020; all enumeration district color maps, \$1224; and all enumeration district street guides, \$238; The entire set is \$147,118.

After the full, reel by reel description is received from the National Archives, Clayton Library Friends will maintain a chart in Clayton Library showing which counties (and parishes) are available for subscription.

As always, Clayton bookplates carrying the generous donor's name and memorial request can adorn the boxes containing the microfilm.

In the event a donor gives a donation for a county already taken, a reel from the same state will be purchased in the donor's name. If the entire state is already taken, then a reel from the next state being purchased designated will be purchased, unless otherwise requested by donor. The order in which Clayton Library Friends is purchasing the microfilm is being determined solely by Marje Harris, Clayton Library Manager.

In the most recent issue of the Dallas Genealogical Society Newsletter, the members of the DGS were boasting about having raised \$7800 and how they must be ahead of Houston. So, how about making a real race out of this and donating another roll of film?

## What's New

The complete index to the civil registrations of births, marriages, and deaths of the United Kingdom from 1837 to 1930 is now available at Clayton Library thanks to a testamentary bequest of Mary Smith Fay, CG, FASG. This makes Clayton the only library in the new world with this important \$9,000 genealogical tool.

The index is first divided into births, marriages, and deaths. Within each of these categories, the index is subdivided into three-month periods (quarters) for each year. Then the records are indexed alphabetically by county. Clayton staff members have the requisite forms for ordering photocopies of the original records from Britain. A helpful companion tool, especially for locating hard-to-find places, is Phillmore's *Atlas of British Shires and Parishes*, already on the shelf.

#### French Genealogy

The indispensable bibliography of French genealogy, Gaston Saffroy, Bibliographie généalogique héraldique et nobiliaire de la France: des origines à nos jours, imprimés et manuscrits, 5 vols. (Paris: Librairie Gaston Saffroy, 1968 - 1988), is on the new items shelf, thanks to the Clayton Library Friends. It should be used side-byside with Etienne Arnault, Répetoire de généalogies françaises

*imprimées*, 3 vols. (Nancy, FR: Berger-Levrault, 1986), which is available on Inter-Library Loan.

Volume 1 of Saffroy contains bibliographies of heraldry, orders of chevalerie, general histories of feudal houses and nobility, genealogy and history of the French royal families from the Merovignian dynasty, and offices and supporters of the royal family.

Volume 2 contains a bibliography of the vital records and church records (état-civil) of each province as well as a bibliography of sources related to each province's history, genealogy, heraldry and nobility. Included in these provincial bibliographies are references to the various kinds of French court records.

Volume 3 contains bibliographies on each published family genealogy. It is vital to make sure that the family name being searched is in the same province as the citation given.

Volume 4 is a bibliography of the sources used and is a valuable tool for additional independent research.

Volume 5 is an update of volumes 14 through the year 1986.

Most of the books cited in Saffroy, even family genealogies, are available through Inter-Library Loan. For copies of articles, the quickest and surest method of obtaining them is to ask for a quote from:

As it is difficult to pull the entire library staff away from their work at the same time, the Friends set up a "grazing" buffet in the staff lounge between 11:30 A.M. and 1:30 P.M. The

buffet featured a selection of casseroles, salads, chips and dips, breads, desserts, and soft drinks, all expertly prepared and presented by the Friends' committee.

We sincerely appreciate the professionalism and hard work of the Clayton staff, and this is just one small way we have to express that appreciation.

### **End-of-Year Purchases**

t the CLF Executive Board meeting on November 13, 2001, Marje Harris, manager of the Clayton Library, presented her recommendations for end-of-year purchases by the Friends. As a non-profit organization, the Friends attempts to end each year with essentially a zero balance in the operating and unrestricted funds accounts, and at its last meeting of the year, the board considers and votes on how to apply the funds from those two accounts.

As a result of Miss Harris's recommendations, the board voted to approve acquisition of approximately \$11,000 worth of books and film on the library's want list, \$1,500 worth of books previously received on approval from Heritage Quest, approximately \$300 in un-sponsored

Angels subscriptions, and five new microfilm cabinets valued at \$6,000. Most of these items have now been ordered or are in the process of being ordered. The acquisition of film over the past two years, and projected acquisition of 1930 census film early this year, made critical the need for additional microfilm cabinets. For this reason, the purchase order for the new cabinets was expedited and they were in place in the library by the end of November. Special thanks to Robert de Berardinis for his work on that effort.

As announced in the previous newsletter, the Friends acquired for the library three new microprint copiers, all purchased with funds from the estate of the late Mary Smith Fay, FASG. At the time these were purchased, the acquisition

of new coin boxes and security software was held back until it could be determined that these items were definitely needed. In December, after further system demonstrations and technical discussions, a decision was made to proceed with these purchases, representing a cost addition of \$1,684. These funds also came from the Fav estate. With the new software, patrons will have the option of either making paper copies or saving the graphic images to a Zip drive.

The Friends sincerely appreciates all those individuals who have responded to our fund raising efforts in 2001. With your help, we really are building a world-class family research library!

## Millennium Book Project

he Millennium Book Project for 2001 was far and away the most successful ever, thanks to our generous membership. Now it is 2002, and time to begin again. The Millennium Book Project is books, microfilm, and microfiche from sources that are not approved vendors for Houston Public Library. And this is where Clayton Library Friends is a big help. Your organization, Calyton Library Friends, will spend hours searching for obscure publishers, translating letters into Lithuanian, and converting U.S. dollars into leu in order to make Clayton the finest public genealogical library in the country.

#### It is important to remember that Clayton Library Friends is a tax-exempt organization with donor contributions being tax deductible!

Each book, film, or fiche for which funds are donated carries a beautiful bookplate (label). At the donor's discretion, this will bear the donor's name and the name of the person(s) that the owner wishes to memorialize. These bookplates when worn out get replaced with the same information, until the end of time!

The Massachusetts vital records transcribed onto microfiche is the latest "Book" project. These are transcriptions of the actual recordations up to, in most cases, 1849 and in rare cases to 1905. This is an ideal acquisition in which to participate as each fiche is only \$4! And yes, a bookplate can be put on a single fiche!

These will make superb birthday gifts for children and grandchildren instead of some hideously expensive computer game. And surely they will savor in the many years to come the thought that Grandma or Grandpa or mom or dad left them this precious bit of their heritage. And these fiche, unlike fish, do not stink after three days.

The St. James parish documents are found translated and abstracted in Eileen Larré Behrman, comp., *St. James Parish, Louisiana Colonial Records*, 1782-1787 (Conroe, Tex.: p.p., 1980), catalogued as 976.3 B421 LA St. James Parish.

The St. Charles parish documents are found translated and abstracted in Glenn R. Conrad, *St. Charles: Abstracts of the Civil Records of St. Charles Parish*, 1700-1803 (Lafayette, La.: Center for Louisiana Studies, 1974), catalogued as 976.3 C754 LA St. Charles Parish.

The Avoyelles parish documents are found translated and abstracted in Winston De Ville, *Calendar of Louisiana Colonial Documents* (Baton Rouge: Louisiana State Archives and Records Commission, 3 vols in 1, 1961), vol. 1, catalogues as 976.3 L888 LA.

The 1804 census of New Orleans covers essentially the modern day French quarter and is especially useful for identifying free people of color who were living in that area.

nyone with German ancestry should examine the very valuable Deutsches Geschlechterbuch (German Lineage Book) volumes, available at Clayton Library. Subtitled Genealogisches Handbuch Bürgerlicher Familien (Genealogical Handbook of Bourgeois

Families), this multi-volume set At Clayton, the first 75 volumes contains lineage tables and biographical compilations for thousands of bourgeois German families dating back

several hundred years. Genealogical information includes family relationships; date and place of birth, baptism, marriage, and death; information concerning professions and military service; places of residence; and other data extracted from primary and secondary sources. The only serious shortfall to the series is the lack of citations to original sources, many of which are civil and church registers whose present location may be very difficult to determine.

The series is divided into three segments: Volumes 1-119 contain the Alten Reihn [old lines]; volumes 120-170 contain the Neue Reihn [new lines]; and volumes 171-198 are the Ergänzungsregister, Neue Reihn [supplemental registers, new lines]. At Clayton, the first 75 volumes are on microfilm in the microprint area, and volumes 127-198 are available in book form in the German section (GEN 943 5783 GERMANY). Volumes 76-126 are not currently owned by Clayton Library. Each volume has a double index. In the front of each volume is an index to the major family names

found in the volume; in the back is an every-name index.

Although written in German, entries in this series of books can be readily understood provided the researcher has a basic knowledge of the organization of the series and the meanings of a few key German words. Most of the words

> (except for place names) appearing in the biographical sketches and the terms identified in the list of abbreviations

can be easily translated using a German-English dictionary. One is available in this same area of the library (German section). Look for call number GEN 943 B 565 GERMANY.

The Abkürzungen und Zeichenerklärungen [explanation] of abbreviations and symbols], which appears in the front of each volume, provides all of the basic information needed to decipher the biographical sketches. Following are some of the abbreviations and symbols used:

- geboren = born
- vermahlt = married
- gestorben = died
- Ebd. ebenda = in the sameplace
- kath. katholisch = Catholic
- Ritter = knight Rr
- S. v. Sohn von = son of
- Tochter von = daughter
- Wwe Witwe = widow
- Wwr Witwer = widower

A quick-study example of the kind of information contained in Geschlechterbuch can be seen in the ABENDROTH family compilation beginning at the front of *Band* [volume] 127:

On the first page of the Abendroth family section is a pedigree chart listing, by reference numbers only, the individuals described in the accompanying genealogy. Reference numbers consist of a Roman numeral (I, II, III, etc.) indicating the generation, a letter (a, b, c, etc.) indicating the specific individual within a given generation, and a Seite [page] number (S.15, S.16, etc.) on which the biographical information can be found.

#### Example (vol. 127, p.3):

Sohn:

### Revolutionary War Records Added

hanks to generous donations by the Paul Carrington Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution, and Mr. Tom Green, Clayton Library Friends was able to add National Archives microfilm, M 853, Numbered Record Books Concerning Military Operations and Service, Pay, and Settlement of Accounts, and Supplies in the War Department Collection of Revolutionary War Records, to the Clayton Library holdings.

This set of records concerns various pay, orderly, and commissary records of both Continental Line and militia groups, thus using the index and the records are advised for all Revolutionary War research.

Researchers, after finding citations in the Special Index, must consult the M 853 Descriptive Pamphlet before attempting to find the relevant microfilm roll and individual record. A very short synopsis of the same information concerning M 853 can be also be found in [National Archives], *Military Service Records: A Select Catalog of National Archives Microfilm Publications* (Washington, D.C.: NARA, 1985), pp. 30810, on the shelf at Clayton at 016.973 N277 USA.

In the Miscellaneous Records Section of the Revolutionary War, only five microfilm publications are left for purchase by generous Clayton Library Friends' donors, 3 of which are only single rolls!

Remember, these rolls (\$34 each) may have bookplates put on them with the donor's name and in memory or in honor of donor requests. ## 1930 Census Update

ember response to our appeal for funds to purchase 1930 census microfilm has been absolutely outstanding! As of January 5, the 1930 census fund amounted to over \$31 thousand, boosted significantly by major grants from the Smith and Huffington foundations. Closed to the public for 72 years, the 1930 census will be released in April 2002 by the National Archives, and Clayton Library Friends will place its first order as soon as they can be accepted.

Many of our members sent in checks for specific states and/or counties, and there is some duplication among these. As gifts come in, each is numbered and dated, and the Friends will use this as a basis for establishing which patron will sponsor each roll of film. If you were not the first to sponsor a particular roll, someone from the Friends will contact you and ask for an alternate selection.

Sample microfilm from the various vendors were obtained and tested by the Clayton Library staff, and at its November 13 meeting, the CLF board received a recommendation from Marje Harris to place its initial

film order with Scholarly Resources. Less expensive microfilm is available from other vendors; however, these were judged by the library to be inferior with respect to readability. As expected, the per-roll cost for the Scholarly Resources product will be \$34.

As previously mentioned in the newsletter, the Friends will apply unrestricted funds in priority order starting with Texas and the surrounding states. If your ancestors were in some other part of the country in 1930, you may be disappointed to find that the film you need is not on our immediate "buy" list. The best way to ensure that Clayton has film of the state and county you need is to make a restricted gift for it. When sending in your check, write the county and state you need in the memo field.
