Searching Adoption Records 101

Speaker: Patricia G Taylor, LCSW, PhD

We will focus on identifying adoptions and orphans from the 19th and 20th century in your family tree and the obstacles to searching for their biological families. An historical perspective on adoption, including the % phan Train+ and what it means to your search will be discussed. Presented by an adoption specialist and avid family history researcher, state adoption laws and practices will be explained. Genetic testing as a possible link to biological families will be explored. Basic internet skills will be sufficient.

Trish has been researching her family history for about 25 years and as a Family History



Consultant has helped many others in their search for their roots, particularly in Texas. As a professional psychotherapist, adoption specialist, and PhD researcher she has helped many families with adoption-related issues, including searching for biological relatives. She has published in peer reviewed journals and held workshops about genetics and its relationship to adoptive children. She maintains an active therapy and consultative practice in Houston and recently retired from the University of Houston.

Acquisitions Committee Report

During this quarter the Clayton Library Friends Acquisitions Committee has continued its mission of supporting the Clayton Library by working with Sue Kaufman and the Collection Development team to identify and order materials which the library would like to add to its collection.

Many of these titles were ordered from mainstream genealogical publishers such as the Genealogical Publishing Company and Heritage Books, but others came from sources which may be more difficult and time-consuming for the Houston Public Library to purchase. Several titles were purchased from the estate of the late Tommye Burns. These included some informative Louisiana titles and some Irish material that Clayton did not own. A number of books published by the Indiana Historical Society were brought back from the FGS Conference in Fort Wayne, Indiana, by Sue Kaufman, and CLF was able to purchase them. In October, again at the request of our library collection development team, over \$1,300.00 worth of lowa materials were ordered for Clayton from the lowa Genealogical Society. And, of course, we have continued to work on the *Book for Every County* project, to fulfill our aim to put a book on the shelves for every county in every state.

In addition, CLF has made a second donation this year of \$2,500. to bind books and periodicals. This money was approved by the Board earlier in 2013, and will be used now because HPL has exhausted its bindery funds for this fiscal year.

You may notice that some of the materials mentioned in the Acquisitions Committee reports this year have not yet found their way on to the Library shelves. HPL has been making the transition to a new system which has led to some delays in all aspects of technical services, such as ordering books, as well as cataloging and processing them. However, we hope that this is a temporary problem, and that you will start to see many of our new acquisitions appearing on the shelves at Clayton in the very near future.

I am often asked the question "What volunteer opportunities are available at Clayton Library?" However, I am always interested to know if any volunteers (or potential volunteers) have any ideas for what might make an interesting volunteer project that would be of use to the library and its patrons. Projects can be designed and intended for groups large or small, or for individual volunteers who simply see a need for something to be done and who are willing to put in the time to make it happen.

I am so appreciative of the incredibly strong volunteer base that we have here at the Clayton Library, and I also appreciate hearing from the volunteers on ways to improve the volunteer program, including ideas for potential volunteer projects. So today's answer to the question "What volunteer opportunities are available at Clayton Library?" is this: "What volunteer opportunities would you like to see at Clayton Library?+ and have what volunteer opportunities would you be willing to participate?" When did you last update your genealogy research?

You ran out of resources (and ideas) and said ‰ guess that logn done.+ Since then, guess what? Clayton Library has continued to acquire more references. Maybe only one or two that relate to your family research, or maybe a whole collection of great information.

And back then, when you ran out of resources at Clayton, did we have the wonderful relationship with LDS with the capabilities of ordering microfilm from Salt Lake to view at the Clayton House? By the way, Salt Lake is constantly adding new resources too. You can check their catalog and order film online. You are notified when the film has arrived, and you can visit the House to use it.

Also, have you checked resources online . such as Ancestry.com? You say you arend a subscriber and itos too expensive? Your relationship with the Houston Public Library makes an International Library Edition of Ancestry available to you free on library computers . along with access to other Library Editions of databases. And, all of these databases are constantly being updated. But be careful, online family trees may give clues, but find the documentation before accepting any part of them. And watch for carelessness . an abodegon one document that was clearly Hampton Courtq was entered in a family tree as ±lampton Court Palace.g (Hampton Court is the ±namlet across the bridgeg from Hampton Court Palace.) You can imagine the online stories that evolved from this error.

My current genealogy project is for a friend who only knew that her g-grandfather was born in England and brought his family to America several generations ago. Ten or fifteen years ago CLF purchased the BMD (birth, marriage, death) records indexes of England -- a large collection of microfiche. I remembered that people who tried to use them were not totally thrilled. Ancestry.com now has those indexes online and I understand The indexes list the names the problem. alphabetically in quarterly increments . i.e. Jan-Feb-Mar of a given year . and abbreviate the first names sufficiently to fit the index columns. Thus, Chamney, C might be the Charles that lom looking for, or it could be a Caroline that lom not looking for. I started my current project about five years ago using the identification information in the BMD indexes and then sending to the General Register Office, England for a certified copy of several documents. for something like 10 British pounds each. A wonderful document with the desired details, but costly. About that time ±ifeqinterfered and that research got buried on the desk.

A couple of months ago it was time to return to researching the English family. Yes, you heard that joyous yelp from me clear across Houston when I discovered that Ancestry now had online IMAGES of some Parish Records and Bishops Transcripts from the London Metropolitan Archives. Baptism records show dates, abode, parents, and parents occupations. not just an index of names. I was able to move from the 1874 immigration back to 1756 -- with documentation!!

Ites time for you to review your research again . where are the £holesq and is information now available through Clayton Library that will help you? Use Claytones books, microfilm, and the HPL online databases . and maybe well hear a whole chorus of joyous exclamations.

She is chairman of the Hunt County Historical Commission and has researched and written numerous historical markers for Hunt County. She currently does oral history interviews with individuals whose lives have influenced recent Hunt County history. She has a special interest in preservation of historic cemeteries.

Carol holds Bachelors and Masters Degrees in Education from Midwestern State University. She received a Masters Degree in History from Texas A&M University-Commerce in 2008. She combines a love for history and genealogy into her specialty of merging family history with local history.

Carol Taylor began her family history at age twelve by interviewing relatives, some born in the 1890s. For more than thirty years genealogy has been an enduring interest. She has spoken to genealogy societies throughout North Texas and at the Angelina College Genealogy Conference in Lufkin. She writes a weekly column % ree Climbing +, combining both local history and genealogy for the *Greenville Herald Banner*. Carol is co-author of *The Devil's Triangle: Ben Bickerstaff, Northeast Texas, and the War of Reconstruction*. She recently wrote *Greenville* for the *Images of America* series published by Arcadia Publishing.
