Volunteer Projects at Clayton Library -

Volunteers at Clayton Library have recently embarked on a new project to index the Harris County marriage license microfilm for the years 1931-1947. This period of years represents records that are not currently covered by any online indexing (Ancestry.com and Familysearch.org have indexes for 1837-1931, while the Harris County Clerk website has an index for 1947 to present). Ten volunteers are currently going roll-by-roll, record-by-record through the microfilm collection to create a single, comprehensive index for this entire period.

Information being indexed from the records includes the names of the bride and groom, their ages, and the date of the marriage license. Once the index is complete, library patrons will be able to use it to quickly and easily find Harris County marriage licenses from this time period.

CLF purchases Yizkor books --

Yizkor (memorial) books, mainly in Hebrew or Yiddish, were written after the Holocaust as memorials to Jewish communities destroyed in the Holocaust. They were usually put together by survivors from those communities (landsmanshaftn - mutual aid society, benefit society, or hometown society of Jewish immigrants from the same European town or region) and contain descriptions and histories of the community, biographies of prominent people, lists of people who perished, etc. They are often embellished with photos, maps, and other memorabilia.

Yizkor books can be valuable to anyone wanting to learn about Jewish life and culture in the communities that vanished in the Holocaust. Yizkor books are valuable to genealogists, since the books may include biographies or photographs of relatives, or may include family members in a list of people who perished. These books also give important background information about the history and Jewish life in a particular community.

Seven of the Yizkor books were recently purchased .

- (2) Dubossary Memorial Book
- (3) Memorial Book of the Jewish Community of Yurburg, Lithuania
- (4) Preserving Our Litvak Heritage (two volumes)

- (6) Memorial Book of Podhajce, Ukraine

Clayton Library Friends, a *±*community partnerqof the Houston History Alliance, was a participant in their Pop-Up Museum exhibit program during their 6th Annual Symposium. The event, entitled "The History of Houston's Musical Soul," was held on Saturday, October 1, 2016 at Match Theatre, 3400 Main Street, Houston, Texas. Clayton Library Friends had two tables and a wall display to showcase the Clayton family and their historic home, the Clayton house, built in 1917, which was deeded by the Clayton family to the City of Houston in 1966 for the sole purpose to be used as a genealogical library.



There is a wonderful "museum" collection of photos and archives on display in the foyer of the Clayton House. Several years ago Steven Bychowski, a Clayton Library staff member, had the idea to display photos and other memorabilia about William Lockhart Clayton and his family, and worked with Susan Garwood, their greatgranddaughter, to assemble the collection. She is a member of Clayton Library Friends and a generous supporter of the Friends and Clayton Library. Part of that display was used in the pop-up exhibit for the recent event. Susan Garwood even brought "personal" items of Will and Susan (Vaughan) Clayton which were displayed in a table top museum case on loan from Greg Matthews.

To make the event more "fun," Susan Garwood dressed in the period attire of her great-grandmother and Randy Pace donned attire to compliment Susan's costume. Barbara Richards helped install the display and was on hand with Susan Kaufman, manager of Clayton Library, to greet visitors, tell them about the Clayton family, and promote Clayton Library and Clayton Library Friends.

The theme of the event was music, so Susan Kaufman brought recordings of Cole Porter music to entertain visitors. To promote the importance and significance of the Clayton family, Randy Pace donated a book for a door prize entitled, "Will Clayton - A Short Biography" written by Ellen Clayton Garwood, Susan's grandmother. 
It was a fun event and well received by the enthusiastic, music-loving crowd.

Clayton Library Friends (CLF) was a Silver Sponsor at the 7th Annual Texas General Land Office's "Save Texas History Symposium" in San Antonio, Texas on Saturday, September 17, 2016. Created in 2004, the *Save Texas History* program is a statewide initiative to rally public support and private funding for the preservation and promotion of Texas history. The event was held at the historic Menger Hotel on the Alamo Plaza. The program was entitled, *The Alamo: Keystone of Texas History - Past, Present and Future*." The program consisted of many Texas historians speaking about the history and significance of the Alamo as well as work that is happening today and planned for the future.

CLF had a table at the event to promote the Friends and Clayton Library Center for Genealogical Research. Volunteer and CLF member, Liz Hicks attended the seminar and "manned" our table with information and brochures promoting us and the library. Thanks, Liz!

<u>In Memoriam</u>



National: In early September we took the exhibit to the Federation of Genealogical Societies (FGS) Annual Conference in Springfield, Illinois for three days. Our booth was very well-received. The backdrop was complimented by everyone who walked by. Our full-page color ad was on the inside front cover of the daily program and looked outstanding.

Joy Oria, Clayton librarian, and Sue Kaufman, Clayton Manager, were great to have in the booth. Although Sue was busy with many of her other duties with FGS, she spent a lot of time in the booth. Joy is a very friendly, always smiling person who was answering a lot of different questions about the collection, and was definitely an asset for us.
