Harris County Historical Documents **Chris Daniel, District Clerk**



The Harris County Historical Document Room, located at 201 Caroline (Room 200), opened to the public in 2006. It contains historical legal documents accumulated by the county dating back to 1837. The Harris County District Clerk's Office has teamed with the Houston Bar Foundation to raise the funds needed to restore and preserve fragile documents.

Chris Daniel, a native Houstonian, grew up in Jersey Village. He earned a mechanical engineering degree from UT in Austin, and later graduated from South Texas College of Law, passing the bar in 2011. He was elected Harris County District Clerk in 2010 and re-elected in 2014, where he heads an office staffed by 550 people and oversees a \$36 million budget. The Harris County Historical Document Room is a portion of his responsibility.

Converting Old slides Into Digital Images –

(from the Clayton Library newsletter)

Clayton Library is pleased to provide technology that helps library visitors preserve their records, documents, and photos. In my last technology article, I talked about Clayton Library's Kodak EZ Photo Scanner, a device capable of high-quality bulk photo scanning at the rate of 25 photos per minute. Today's article introduces the Kodak SlideSnap Lite, a quick and easy way to convert photographic images found on those old-fashioned slides (the little 2+ x 2+ squares set in cardboard, plastic, or metal/glass frames) that you may have stored away at home in a closet. These slides may contain some of your earliest photos, perhaps some special memories from travels or other significant life events. This article provides a basic overview of the Kodak SlideSnap Lite and includes some tips on how to use it effectively to preserve your family memories.

The Kodak SlideSnap Lite is an automated device that allows you to load up to 80 slides at a time into a circular carousel tray. Once your slides are loaded into the tray and positioned correctly, you basically press the %go+ button and within about 10-15 minutes, the slide scanner's digital camera will convert all of the slide images into digital photos. You can then remove those 80 slides and proceed with the next batch of slides, repeating the process until all of your slides have been scanned and digitized.

Here are a few helpful hints for using the Kodak SlideSnap Lite:

- Printed guides are available at the scanner, but if it's your first attempt at slide scanning, we strongly recommend letting us know so we can give you a hands-on overview of how to get started.
- The digital camera that is used with the slide scanner will need to be re-installed and re-positioned by a staff member prior to your use of the slide scanner.
- Default camera settings are set for optimal viewing brightness, though some settings can be changed for advanced users. please ask a staff member for assistance if you wish to change any of the camera's default image settings.
- Make sure all slides face the same direction as they go around the circular carousel tray. The side of the slide containing the graphics and developing lab's logo should face away from the camera so as to prevent mirror images. People's heads should be pointed upwards (or pointed outwards to the outside of the tray, if you rotate the slide due to its size/shape).
- Note: If you have your own circular carousel tray at home, you can bring it with you and use it. the tray that is included with the slide scanner is removable. However, some tray types are incompatible with the Kodak SlideSnap Lite. If in doubt, just use the tray that comes included with the slide scanner.
- It is not uncommon for a few old slides that are slightly warped around the edges to become temporarily stuck in the slide scanner during the automated scanning process (this is especially true for slides with cardboard frames). If this happens, don't worry. the scanning will pause until the stuck slide is removed, and then automated scanning will resume once again. The slide will not be damaged in any way. (We'll show you a quick and easy method for removing a stuck slide when we give you the basic overview.)
- By default, slides are scanned and saved on the digital camera as .jpg files. You can choose a different file type if you wish.
- When all of your slides are finished scanning, you will need to remove the memory card from the camera, put it into a memory card reader (please bring one if you have one, otherwise you can borrow the library's card reader from the staff. It is kept at the Microprint Desk), and then move the photos to a computer and onto your flash drive. We can help you with this process if you need assistance.
- Take your new digital photos home, do some basic photo editing if you wish, and then share your photos with family and friends!

When you are ready to bring in your slides for scanning, you can call the Clayton Library (832-393-2600) to reserve a 2-hour time block (recommended, but not required). Be sure to bring a flash drive with you, and also a memory card reader (if you have one).

We would like to thank the Clayton Library Friends for their generous donation of this equipment to the Clayton Library. We hope you will use it to digitally preserve the memories on your slides so that you can share them with others, and pass them along to future generations.

Clayton Library Treasure – Did you know?

The Cuban Papers

Clayton Library has an extensive collection of more than 100 reels of microfilm comprising more than a million documents relating to the Spanish Colonial Period . 1571 to 1820. Officially called the *Papeles Procedentes de Cuba*, they are part of the *Archivo General de Indias* in Seville, Spain. The records are approximately 2,972 *legajos* (bundles) which were kept ribbon-tied with about 100 to 800 folio pages and include millions of individual documents. They begin in the 1570s (founding of St. Augustine) and they end in the 1820s (cession to U.S). They are part of the Spanish Colonial administrative records with corresponding archival materials in many other related archives including the Archivo General de la Nacion in Mexico City and many related archives in Spain. The documents are approximately 60% Spanish, 25% French and about 15% English and Latin.¹ Called the Cuban Papers because the vast majority of colonial Spanish records for what today is the United States and the northern gulf coast region ended up in Havana when Florida became a part of the United States. The records were not moved to the archives in Seville, Spain until the late 1880s.

The documents cover a wide range and include (among other items):

Correspondence to the Governors

From Post Commanders to other military officers
From private citizens
From minor public officials in the colonies
From the Ministry of the Indies, including the Council of the Indies
From the Viceroy of New Spain in Mexico City
Documents from outposts -- records related to settlements, immigrants, government passes, and legal proceedings

Tax list
Pay reports for local officials
Pay reports of regular military (not militia)
The King's Warehouses reports and account books
Reports of city syndicos
Reports of the Intendant
Includes census and miscellaneous reports.²

Now that you have a broad overview of their contents, how do you navigate them? Fortunately, there are many finding aids. However, most of them are broad indexes. So ultimately, a researcher may have to scroll through many reels of films to find what they are searching for. Let's review a few.

Roscoe Hill, a Professor of History at the University of New Mexico published in 1916 what he titled, *A Descriptive Catalogue of the Documents relating to the History of the United States in the Papeles Procedentes de Cuba deposited in the Archivo General de Indias at Seville*. Dispatches from name places, i.e. Natchez, Pensacola, and New Orleans are included, and important military figures and governors are listed. Hard copy is available upstairs with the film collection at Clayton and the book is available to download on-line.

Three additional finding aids that are most used, in addition to Roscoe Hill, are:

- *How to Navigate the Cuban Papers, 1571 – 1820* by Robert de Berardinis . This includes several other research aids.
- *Cuban Papers Facts Sheet* by Don Pusch
- Clayton's finding aid *How to Search the Cuban Papers using PARES* by Chloe Bailey. This aid is specific to Clayton's collection and would be the finding aid any Clayton researcher should review first.

A few important things to remember when researching Spanish Colonial Documents: There was no common law in Spanish areas. Women had equal property rights to men. Women kept their maiden names, had community property, and had to inherit as did legitimate children. Research by place-of-residence or by place-of-passage. Attempt to consult treasury or warehouse books, judicial records. Civil lawsuits were a favorite form of indoor entertainment, so cross-checking against judicial records is recommended.²

Any reel of microfilm pulled is a treasure of history, so don't be afraid that they are not in English. Some of the colonial Spanish and French handwriting is beautiful script and not too difficult to read. Lists of warehouse inventory and soldier lists are sometimes easier to read than correspondence, but all is worth viewing.

In this new book, Carroll includes little-known and newly uncovered letters by General Pershing, as well as those who served with him, to create an incredibly vivid and poignant account of the American experience in World War I.


Simultaneous with the book launch, Carroll will initiate the "**Million Letters Campaign**" a nationwide effort encouraging Americans to seek out and preserve 1,000,000 letters from every U.S. conflict. To mark the war's centennial, Carroll helped curate two exhibits both called *My Fellow Soldiers*, at Chapman University and the Smithsonian's National Postal Museum. Carroll was also featured in the PBS film about World War I, *The Great War*, which premiered on April 10, 2017.



Andrew Carroll is the founding director of the Center for American War Letters at Chapman University in Orange, California. Along with editing the *New York Times* bestsellers *War Letters* and *Behind the Lines*, Carroll edited *Operation Homecoming*, which inspired the Emmy-winning documentary of the same name. Carroll lives in Washington, D.C. and Orange, California.

In early March the exhibit was a part of the Texas State Historical Association conference held in downtown Houston. Five CLF members shared the booth duties -- Barbara Richards, Randy Pace, Pat Metcalfe, Sue Yerby, and Nick Cimino.
