

John Sellers will give an overview of courthouse research with an emphasis on resources available at the Clayton Library. He will identify courthouse resources that can be accessed on the FamilySearch site through the Clayton Library and its connection as a FamilySearch Affiliate Library. He will also reference some of the most useful sources that we have at Clayton in book form.

John A. Sellers, a fifth generation native of Hopkins County, Texas, graduated from Texas Tech University, with a degree in advertising/public relations, and received his teaching certificate in history from Texas A & M, Commerce. A genealogical researcher since 1985, John's favorite area of research is in the courthouse. He has visited courthouses in several southern states and has conducted extensive research in Texas and Louisiana.

#### Hello everyone --

I hope this finds everyone well, wondering where the year went, and maybe thinking about the holidays. Another family history month has come and gone, thank you to all that joined us on our virtual programs in October, or at any time in this year. We hope you enjoy them, and yes, we will continue to offer virtual programs. For the upcoming events visit <u>www.houstonlibrary.org/events</u> and limit the search to History and Research to see our programs and our sister units' programs. As *research centers* that focus on special collections related to *history*, local and beyond, programs from those units might be of interest to you also.

Research centers. History research centers. That is what binds the three special collections units of the Houston Public Library – history and research. And with that realization, the special collection locations of the Houston Public Library have been renamed "History Research Centers". For the official press release visit History Research Centers make debut in renaming of sites for archives and special collections

So, you ask, what is the Clayton new "brand"? Please let me introduce....*The Houston Public Library's Family History Research Center at the Clayton Library Campus*. All three special collections carry new names as you can see on the History Research Centers webpage <a href="https://houstonlibrary.org/hrc">https://houstonlibrary.org/hrc</a>.

As Dr. Rhea Brown Lawson, Library Director, mentions in the press release "with this renaming, the Houston community and visitors stand to gain a greater understanding of what can be found at the History Research Centers. The History Research Centers are wonderful destinations that will appeal to anyone wanting to discover what's hiding in plain sight."

In keeping current within the research field, the change from "genealogical research" in the previous name to "family history" acknowledges a shift of the pursuit into mainstream language. When the rebranding project was delivered to the managers of the collections to discuss and plan, it was my suggestion that we change to the more common and descriptive term, family history. Along with Dr. Lawson's desire to brand the locations as "research centers", the two terms were married to form Family History Research Center.

To continue to honor the Clayton family legacy and to recognize the support of the Clayton Library Friends, all branding officially has become The Family History Research Center at the Clayton Library Campus.

This might not come as a surprise to some considering we have a beautiful monument sign with the updated name and have for a while now. The re-brand is official. What hasn't changed is our commitment to provide world class resources and expert staff who provide one-on-one research assistance to help you find your ancestors and YOUR family history.

While the weather is so beautiful, the staff invites you to come to the library and take a picture in front of the new sign after a day of research, and share it, telling everyone what a wonderful time you had at the library!

## SLATE OF NOMINEES Election of 2023 CLF Executive Board members Annual Meeting on November 19, 2022

Clayton Library Friends members who are elected to the following Executive Board vacancies at the Annual Meeting in November 2022 will assume office on January 1, 2023. The term of office is two years.



### Jessica Horne Collins – President

A former information systems analyst, Jessica Horne Collins now documents ancestors rather than software bugs. Jessica has served on the CLF board for three years as 1st Vice President-Membership and represents our organization to the National Genealogical Society Delegate Council, of which she is an incoming Steering Committee member. Jessica assisted with the planning and launch of Genealogy Face2Face, CLF's virtual meetings/Zoom hangouts, that began in 2020 after the library's COVID-19 closure. She continues as one of its rotating hosts and as an occasional speaker on genealogical topics.

Since discovering family history in 2012, Jessica has furthered her genealogical knowledge through study groups (ProGen, GenProof, NGSQ) and by attending local seminars, state conferences, and the Texas Institute for Genealogical Research (TIGR). She was a 2022 recipient of an AncestryProGenealogist scholarship, attending the Midwest African-American Genealogical Institute (MAAGI) this summer as its awardee.

Jessica is active in the Texas State Genealogical Society as a contributing editor for its journal, *Stirpes*, and on the DNA committee. She is also a member of the Association for Professional Genealogists (APG), South-Central Chapter, and National Society Daughters of the American Revolution.

When she's not researching, Jessica stays busy as the mom of two boys. She volunteers with the Parent/Teacher Organizations at her sons' schools, is involved with her church's music ministry, and sometimes finds time to papercraft.



#### Mary Ramsey Hollis – 1<sup>st</sup> Vice-President/Membership

Mary caught the genealogy bug from her Aunt Mildred who began genealogy research in the 1960s (before computers and Ancestry.com).

Mary enjoys research & tying historical events to the family history. She's been involved in genealogy for only about twenty-five years. Mary has been retired since 2016 and doesn't know how she had time to do her day job, which was on the systems side of HR/Payroll/Benefits in the field called Human Resources Information Systems, always in the corporate world. Mary has been a volunteer at Clayton Library for several years and looks forward to the day she can return to the library in that capacity, in addition to going as a patron. She's been a member of CLF since about 2019.

Mary was one of the five women who worked on the Houston Suffragists Project in 2020, finding the women who likely voted in 1920 in Houston & Harris County after the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment was passed in 1920. See HoustonSuffragists.org. We found approximately 3500 women who likely voted in 1920.

Mary has become the family historian & archivist and the repository/custodian for all family things as closets, garages, & attics are cleaned out. She enjoys attending online webinars in between research and helping with two great-nephews, ages 10 and 6, and a great-niece, age 4.

#### Mazella Boulden – 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice-President/Ways & Means

Mazella was born and raised in Ponca City, OK. She graduated from Ponca City High School and Central State University, now known as University of Central Oklahoma in 1975 with a bachelor's degree in Biology with minors in Chemistry and Math. Her first job was with Conoco, Inc. for summers during college and for 5 years before relocating to Freeport, TX where she negotiated Wastewater, Solid Waste and RCRA permits for 29.75 years for BASF Corporation. After retiring, she worked for IEA Inc., an Environmental Consulting Firm in Houston. This job included Environmental auditing and allowed her to travel through numerous cities and states and 2 provinces in Canada.

In retirement Mazella has helped to lead the Senior Adult Ministry for 15 years at the New Faith Church in Houston where she has been a member for 30 years. Concurrent jobs included pianist and organist at several churches in Brazoria County as well as teaching piano to young children.

Currently Mazella's hobbies include making handmade greeting cards and of course genealogy. She got hooked on genealogy when she found out that her 2<sup>nd</sup> great grandfather was a Free Person of Color and was one of three black members of the Creek Tribal Leadership in Indian Territory. Mazella sometimes attended Clayton Library presentations prior to the pandemic, eventually discovering Face2Face Genealogy, and has been hooked ever since.

#### Carol A. Peña – Director/Programs



Carol A. Peña is a native Texan with a passion for genealogy and creative writing. As a fifth generation Texan she has been researching her maternal line since 2011. Carol is an active Board member of the Bay Area Writers League and has published family stories in several anthology-style books. Growing up, the middle child of seven, she was always fascinated by her mother's ghost and family history stories. Her mother's storytelling led to Carol's love of reading and passion for genealogical discoveries.

In 2015, to prepare for a family reunion, she stepped up her research. She successfully added the next generation to her maternal family tree with names, birth, death, and marriage information. Carol added +600-relatives and recorded several "Mom, Tell Me A Story" video segments in time for the reunion's family history presentation.

Carol has been active in Clayton Library Friends on the Programs committee, acting as co-host and helping to facilitate Face2Face sessions as well as presenting one. She successfully completed the Boston University genealogy program Principles class. She plans on completing the Certificate program there. BU recommends a break after the Principles class to practice, and encourages volunteer work with genealogical organizations before starting the Certificate program. Carol has been a member of CLF since April 2021.

#### Kristin Dennis – Director/Volunteers & Hospitality

My name is Kristin Dennis and I am so happy to have found Clayton Library! I was absolutely blown away just to see what resources were available when I moved here from Michigan in 2015. I was in AWE of all the wonderful resources they have available for researchers and was very fortunate that I could slip away during my workday to spend some time at Clayton. I was encouraged to join the Clayton Library Friends and I started attending Genealogy Face2Face lectures. I started to volunteer as I decided to give back to the community that has given me so much more than I could ever repay and here I am now!

My educational background is in history and I am a very long-time antique photo collector, beginning when I was a teenager (over thirty years ago) spending my allowance at my local flea market buying CdV (Carte de Visite) images, magazines, and other pieces of ephemera. My favorite images were the Civil War-era ladies, dressed in their very best. How does this relate to genealogy? Some of the images had names and short biographies. When Family Search went online, I was absolutely on board even though I had absolutely no idea how to search records - what the records even were - and what to do with them if I bumbled around and actually found something. I backed away slowly, frustrated that it wasn't as intuitive as I had hoped.

Around 2005, I regained interest as I developed a better historical understanding after college and found employment in archives. I spoke with my dear aunt who I knew was very focused on researching her father's line. She rekindled that interest. I still was focused on my photo collection. Who *were* they?! What kind of lives did they lead? Did they have families? I had many more questions than answers. I started building their stories and posting their images on Family Search under the "Memories" tab and on Find a Grave.

About ten years ago it dawned on me to start researching my own family lines and not just my photo collection. I really did not know much, due to early deaths and growing up very far from family. Researching these lines has been fantastic! I found some of my mother's cousins through Ancestry DNA and connected with them. I took to the academic side of genealogy and have attended many state and national conferences. I graduated from Boston University earning a certificate in Genealogical Research over the summer of 2022. Currently, I am attending GenProof 73 and ProGen 63. Upon completion, I will move on to earn my CG and AG credentials. I am constantly stunned over all the paths those little photos of mine have carried me, as all roads travel back to that initial interest.



## **US Census Information Year-by-Year for Genealogists**

When it comes to counting American citizens, we've come a long way in the last 220 years. To help enumerate an estimated 310 million residents in the 2010 census, the Census Bureau expected nearly 3.8 million applicants—almost equal to the total US population in the first census in 1790—for 1.4 million temporary jobs.

Back in 1790, 650 federal marshals did the job over a span of 18 months, traveling house to house, unannounced, at a cost of \$44,000. The marshals used sheets of paper or notebooks they designed themselves (the first centrally produced and printed forms wouldn't be introduced until 1830). That inaugural count of 3.9 million Americans covered 13 states plus the districts of Maine, Vermont, Kentucky and the Southwest Territory (Tennessee).

## **Chronicling America Reaches 50 States**

Chronicling America, the searchable online database of historic American newspapers, will soon include digitized newspapers from all 50 U.S. states, Washington, D.C., Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

Funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) and housed and maintained online at the Library of Congress, <u>Chronicling America</u> offers free online access to 19.9 million pages of newspapers published in the United States between 1777 and 1963.

Established in 2005, Chronicling America gives users on a computer, tablet or phone direct access to American history as it was recorded locally in more than 3,700 newspaper titles in 22 languages.
